Marshall Leads Primary

Raleigh, N.C. – Elaine Marshall is ahead in the race for the Democratic Senate nomination but with a majority of voters undecided the contest is pretty much up in the air right now.

Marshall's getting 29%, compared to 12% for Cal Cunningham, 5% for Kenneth Lewis, and 2% for Marcus Williams. There aren't any clear dividing lines emerging within the numbers yet- Marshall has a double digit lead with liberals, moderates, conservatives, urban, suburban, and rural voters, men, women, Democrats, independents, whites, blacks, every age group except young people, and in every region of the state except metro Charlotte and the northeast.

Even within the Democratic primary electorate none of the candidates are at even 40% name recognition. Marshall is the best known with a 29/9 favorability ratio, followed by Lewis at 9/9, and Cunningham at 9/7.

On the Republican side Richard Burr leads with a surprisingly weak 55% to 10% for Brad Jones and 3% for Eddie Burks. 31% of voters are undecided in that contest.

“It's no surprise there are so many undecideds on the Democratic side and that won't change until the candidates become better known,” said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. “The number of Republicans unwilling to commit to voting for Richard Burr is a bit of an unexpected development.”

PPP surveyed 400 likely Democratic primary voters and 646 likely Republican primary voters from February 12th to 15th. The margin of error for the Democratic survey is +/- 4.9% and for the Republican survey it's +/-3.9%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
